Food Pantry Announcements

January 2023 saw a major change for Good News Outreach Food Pantry. The decision to relocate had been floating around for some time but finally became a reality this January. The Food Pantry relocated from 548 E. Bradford Road to 606 W. 4th Avenue. The move caused the closure of the pantry for one week and all worked hard to quickly resume regular business for our clients.

The challenges, though problematic, were easy to overcome thanks to the leadership of Director of Operations, David Dobbs. He, along with our many volunteers and staff were able to set the food pantry up at the new location, notify the public of the change of address, and resume our weekly service to

Mercy House Women

Ariel Bickelman

Ariel had a rough life growing up. At a young age she was predisposed to drugs, partying, and an unstable home. Her mom was one of many whom she saw lead such unsavory lifestyles. For little Ariel, she thought this was the norm. Having seen this behavior on an ongoing basis, Ariel began modeling what she saw and she too began using drugs at an early age. Needless to say, that lifestyle caused her to make wrong and bad decisions, some of which led to her imprisonment.

Ariel realized a bit too late the devastating effects of the mindset she was accustomed to and knew she had to change in order to make a good life for herself and daughter. Upon release Ariel chose to go to Shisa House here in Tallahassee. It was still close to home, allowed her to save money, and would help set her on the right track. While at Shi-

sa, former Re-entry Director Freddie Rouse came and presented to the women there the opportunity Mercy House has waiting for them. This caught Ariel's attention and she pursued the opportunity.

In September 2022 Ariel came to Mercy House. She realized she still needed help and Mercy House could provide what she needed. Why Mercy House, she was asked, "I heard great things when Mr. Freddie came and spoke to us. It was an opportunity for me to save, it provided a stable, drug-free, and clean environment with people offering to help."

Since entering Mercy House, Ariel has seen people come and go. She is now the longest residing resident and currently serves as the House Manager. She has made tremendous progress, has kept a productive job, and saved enough to buy her own vehicle.

We are very proud of Ariel and continue to wish her well. Stay tuned for updates!



Mercy House Men

Ronnie Walker

Ronnie was raised by his mom, a single parent for most of his life until his mom remarried. In his early childhood his family moved around a lot. He did not have a close relationship with his step-father but was close with his mom, grandmother, and aunt. For the most part he was a good kid, until he wasn't. He says his getting in trouble in school was a cry for help; one that went unheard. His mom taught him right from wrong but not having a father figure in his life he began hanging with the wrong crowd.

His family moved from Gainesville, FL to Williston, moving from a big city to the country.

With not having much to do, he began getting into trouble, but says he developed a good work ethic. Due to peer pressure and the wrong crowd, Ronnie began using drugs and drinking alcohol. He was on a downward slope but he noticed the seemingly prosperous life of those he associated with. It seemed like easy money selling drugs and it lured him in. At the age of 17 he came up on charges as an adult and at 18 he was behind bars. He would soon find himself in and out of prison three more times.

Something happened this last time however, and he began the process to reform himself. He started researching transition homes while at Jefferson Correctional and while participating in the Modality Program, he heard about Mercy House. He would share a lot during group while everyone else mostly kept quiet. The Program Director took note of him and began helping him in his search. He had settled on a transition place in Jacksonville, FL but still took time to talk with then Re-entry Director, Dale White. He liked what he heard and prayed about it; God told him to choose Mercy House.



Since coming to Mercy House Ronnie has obtained his driver's license, bought a vehicle, secured a job, and somewhat found stability. He has managed to maintain his health and wellness and rebuild a strong relationship with his son. His job is contracted by the Government working at the Tallahassee National Cemetery. He has a good working relationship with his boss who is looking to groom him for management, but Ronnie wants to someday acquire his commercial driver's license. For now, his goals are to remain humble and obtain his own apartment. In April Ronnie assumes the House Manager position at Mercy

House and we are ever so proud of him and all of his accomplishments. Stay tuned for updates!
